Jefferson County Human Services is a licensed DHS 75.13 Outpatient AODA clinic. We offer a wide array of evidenced based practices that include both group and individual treatment.



The outpatient clinic employs masters level clinicians that are dually licensed to provide mental health and AODA services. If you need help after normal business hours, please call to be connected to someone in our after hours crisis department.

Individual Therapy

Individual psychotherapy is also known as counseling and is a collaborative process between the therapist and the client that aims to facilitate change and improve quality of life. Therapy can help confront barriers that interfere with emotional and mental well-being, and can also increase positive feelings. Psychotherapy is effective in treating a wide array of diagnosable conditions related to substance use and mental health symptoms.

Group Therapy

Group therapy helps to give individuals a safe and comfortable place where they can work out problems and emotional issues. Clients gain insight into their own thoughts and behavior, and offer suggestions and support to others. . Group members are encouraged to openly and honestly discuss the issues that brought them to therapy. Clients are selected for group on the basis of what they might gain from group therapy interaction and what they can contribute to the group as a whole. Therapy groups may be homogeneous or heterogeneous and the number of group members varies. Groups may be time limited (with a predetermined number of sessions) or indefinite (where the group determines when therapy ends). Membership may be closed or open to new members once sessions begin.

Help is Available

"Addiction is a disease – a treatable disease – and it needs to be understood," says NIDA's Dr. Volkow.

A variety of effective treatments are available for heroin addiction, including both behavioral and pharmacological (medications). Both approaches help to restore a degree of normalcy to brain function and behavior, resulting in increased employment rates and lower risk of HIV and other diseases and criminal behavior. Although behavioral and pharmacologic treatments can be extremely useful when utilized alone, research shows that for some people, integrating both types of treatments is the most effective approach.
