**Jefferson County Criminal Justice Collaboration Council Announces Award  
of  
Treatment Alternatives and Diversion Grant**

The Jefferson County Criminal Justice Collaboration Council (CJCC), is pleased to announce that it has been awarded a grant through the Wisconsin Department of Justice to develop the Jefferson County Alcohol Treatment Court (JCATC). This grant is being awarded through the Treatment Alternatives and Diversion Grant Program and was one of only thirteen projects across the state awarded.

The Jefferson County CJCC developed a subcommittee to facilitate the development of an Alcohol Treatment Court in Jefferson County, which was chaired by Judge Hue. The CJCC determined that the JCATC was needed as Jefferson County's primary drug of abuse is alcohol. DA Happ cites "It is inexpensive, readily accessible and socially acceptable. Jefferson sees more than 300 drunk drivers convicted in the county every year. These offenses don't just risk the lives of the drivers, but they also risk the lives of innocent people on our city and county streets and highways."

Judge Hue further states "The goal of the JCATC is to employ a collaborative, non-adversarial criminal justice approach to prosecution of Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) with an end result of reducing recidivism rates for nonviolent OWI offenders thereby increasing public safety and reducing prison and jail populations by diverting nonviolent OWI offenders through the JCATC. Both human and financial costs of OWI offenses will be significantly lessened. The JCATC will employ the partnership of intense court supervision to hold offenders accountable and comprehensive community based treatment intervention to change destructive behavior to reduce repeat OWI offenses."

In addition to the balanced approach to deal with repetitive offenders, there also is a cost component to the County. A recent study reviewed the impacts of treatment alternatives and diversion programs across the state. It came to the conclusion that for every \$1.00 invested in TAD programs, the yield benefits was \$1.93 to the criminal justice system through averted incarceration and reduced crime.

Further the goal and design of the JCATC is to allow it to be easily expanded in the future to develop future hybrid courts that could also handle mental health, dementia, veterans and drugs depending on priorities developed by the CJCC and funding availability.

The cost to implement the JCATC is approximately \$150,000. \$112,000 is being awarded through the TAD grant program which will facilitate funding a contract service that will provide case management staff to the program. The remainder of costs are provided by the County is through in kind time and utilization of existing County resources. However the grant had no matching requirement due to the award granted by the DOJ.

The CJCC includes all of the primary actors in the criminal justice system: Jefferson County Circuit Court Judges (Judge Koschnick, Judge Weston, Judge Hue and Judge Wambach); Jefferson County District Attorney Susan V. Happ; Public Defender Jeffery De La Rosa; Jefferson County Sheriff Paul Milbrath; Director of Human Services Kathi Cauley; Probation and Parole Supervisor Crystal Reynolds; Chair of the Board of Supervisors John Molinaro; Jefferson County Administrator, Benjamin Wehmeier; and Corporation Counsel Phil Ristow.
